



Is a poetry collection sizzling away on your back-burner or weighing down your bottom drawer? Are you eager for feedback on your latest crop of poems? Whether you're working towards a first or second collection, or just beginning to find your way through the poetry labyrinth, James Harpur will scrutinise your work and present his findings to you face to face in a highly focused one-hour session. Rhythm and meter, line endings, how to start or finish a poem, whether to add a killer adjective or subtract a lame one, or whether or not you have a distinctive poetic voice - James will give you sympathetic, insightful and honest feedback. He can also advise you on such matters as layout and a publishing strategy. Whether you're a veteran of the verse world or a just setting out on your poetic journey, this is a rare opportunity to get critical feedback in person from an experienced practitioner of the poetic craft.

The cost per session/makeover is €100 for a maximum of 20 poems on a maximum of 20 pages (double-spaced 11pt) which includes time spent on them before the sessions. Advance booking is essential – only eight one-hour sessions are available, two per afternoon, Wednesday to Saturday.

James Harpur has had five poetry collections published by Anvil Press. His latest book, Angels and Harvesters (2012), was a PBS Recommendation. The Dark Age (2007) won the Michael Hartnett Award; Oracle Bones (2001) was a Tablet Book of the Year; The Monk's Dream (1996) includes the sonnet sequence that won the British National Poetry Competiton. He is a member of Aosdána.

The Farmgate Café has sponsored the appearance of a poem each week in the *Irish Examiner* for the past three years. The Farmgate Café has long been a welcome place for artists and writers in Cork. 
Paul Casey & Doireann Ní Ghríofa

Paul Casey poet & film-maker was born in Cork, Ireland in 1968. He grew up between Ireland, Zambia and South Africa, and has worked primarily in film, multimedia and teaching. He is the founder and organiser of the weekly Ó Bhéal poetry reading series in Cork city, where he lives. He has published two collections with Salmon home more or less (2012) and Virtual Tides (2016).




Thomas Lynch & Aidan Murphy


Thomas Lynch was born in Detroit in 1948 where he works as a funeral director. He has published fiction, essays, memoirs and five collections of poetry on both sides of the Atlantic. He stays much of each year at the ancestral cottage in County Clare. He has been the subject of two film documentaries and worked as a consultant with the TV drama series Six Feet Under.

He has been twice recipient of the Patrick and Katherine Kavanagh Fellowship. His sixth book, Wrong Side of Town was published in 2015 by the Dedalus Press.






Ailbhe Darcy & Caitríona O'Reilly




Gerry Murphy was born in Cork in 1952 where he still lives. A champion swimmer, he has worked as a professional lifeguard for many years. He has published seven collections of poetry most recently My Flirtation with International Socialism and Muse with Dedalus. In 2005 his versions of the Polish poet Katarzyna Borun-Jagodzinska were published in the volume Pocket Apocalypse.






Tomica Bajsić is a poet, prose writer, graphic designer and translator, an editor of *Poezija* (the leading poetry journal in the countries of former Yugoslavia), General Secretary of Croatian PEN and Vice President of the Croatian Writers Society. He is the author of six books of poetry, a volume of prose, and a picture book. He has edited and translated four international poetry anthologies. He is a special forces veteran of the Croatian War of Independence and many of his most famous poems in English translation recount the horror of war.

In Irish, Cork's name is Corcaigh - from *corcach*, meaning a marsh. Cork is a city of rivers, quays, docks; a city with a long merchantile history. Cork is inextricably linked to many of the key figures and developments in modern Irish language literature - Seán Ó Tuama; Seán Ó Ríordáin; and the dynamism of the Innti movement, centered around the magazine of the same name founded by Michael Davitt.



Tonight IMRAM explores the landscapes, history and people of Cork in a bi-lingual multi-media poetry show. Louis de Paor and Liam Ó Muirthile will read in Irish, and Thomas McCarthy will read in English. They will be accompanied by guitar wizard Enda Reilly, whilst artist Margaret Lonergan will create on-screen projections of the poems, featuring art and archive photographs.
